

As we start the new year we welcome everyone to come along to the Christian Union, which will be run by Mr





Lateral Flow Tests

All secondary school age students should continue to test twice weekly at home. By continuing Lateral Flow Tests, it will be easier to spot asymptomatic spread amongst students. A positive lateral flow should always be followed up with a PCR test and the person testing should isolate until the results are back.

Can anyone be a maths genius?

How many times have you heard someone say "I can't do maths"? Chances are you've said it yourself. According to the charity National Numeracy, around four in five adults in the UK have a low level of numeracy and 17 million adults in England are at roughly the same level as that expected of children in primary school.

Negative attitudes around maths are common but experts say they can actually be a lot more damaging than we realise. When a parent says to their child, "I was never any good at maths", it can encourage their children to feel the same. Throwaway comments about maths can normalise negative attitudes.

While numeracy covers skills such as adding and multiplying, maths is about problem solving. If you got into work on time today, if you made a tea round for the office or if you're deciding what to buy for lunch — that all takes lateral thinking. In other words: maths. The subject may have a bad press, but in fact we all use it all the time — and with a little work we can improve our skills.

Why is reading good for me?

We live in an age where we can spend hours bingeing on TV box sets or surfing social media. But despite these distractions, reading remains a popular pastime. There's still a huge market for novels, with bestsellers like Paula Hawkins' thriller The Girl on the Train able to sell around half a million copies in a year in the UK alone. We know that reading is good for us as it improves our literacy, but what other benefits does it offer?

Hidden health benefits

Studies show that it can increase our emotional intelligence as we understand a range of perspectives and motivations. There is some evidence that mental stimulation is one of the factors that can delay the onset of dementia and reading is among the activities that can help to keep the brain active. It is far from a passive pastime. When we read we create mental simulations of the activities, sights and sounds of scenes in a story, blending these with our own memories and experiences, all of which stimulates the neural pathways.

As well as this, research suggests that reading for 30 minutes a week increases health and wellbeing. Reading for pleasure has been found to improve our confidence and self-esteem, providing the grounding we need to pursue our goals and make life decisions. It can also aid our sleep and reduce feelings of loneliness. To the onlooker, reading can appear to be a solitary and passive activity. But the simple act of picking up a book can do us a world of good

Parents and carers can get involved by watching the videos with your child to see what methods they should be using, and you can also view all of their past scores to see which areas they are struggling on.

The class of 2021 who picked up their results this August had real cause for celebration this year after

receiving some absolutely fantastic A Level and Level 3 results. This year's results demonstrated just how well students were prepared for further education, employment or training.



This year, the school's top attaining student was Johanna Sealey who attained A*'s in Literature, History, Psychology and Criminology who will begin her studies in Philosophy and Theology at the University of Oxford this month. Some of the many other students who attained straight A's or better included Holly Gibson, who gained straight A*s Mathematics, History and Psychology and will be reading Psychology at the University of Leeds in September. Samuel Crossan who gained A*'s in both Product Design and Mathematics as well as an A in Chemistry and will study Chemical Engineering at The University of Leeds as well as Head Boy Rafael Wood and Sebastian Lews-Jones amassed a stunning 3 A* and 3 A grades between them and will both explore travel and volunteering opportunities next year ahead of applying to university in 2022.

Head of Sixth Form Stephen Moffatt said: "I am so extremely proud of this year group who despite all the challenges faced have secured a truly outstanding set of outcomes. They thoroughly deserve their success following two years of extremely hard work and commitment, as well as the relentless positivity and resilience they have shown. Whilst we are clearly delighted with their academic achievements we are just as proud of the individuals they have become".



The current cohort of Year 13 students are working hard in advance of their upcoming UCAS assessments and alongside their personal tutors are drafting their personal statements to support their aspirations for next year whether that be an undergraduate course at university, degree level apprenticeship or alternative route into employment.



Our new Year 12 students have made a fantastic start to life at The Bishops' Sixth Form. After their enrolment into their chosen A Level and Level 3 courses they were put through their paces by the British Army as part of their induction day. The students had to work together in order to solve a range of problem solving and team building activities aimed at getting them out of their comfort zones and demonstrating some of the qualities needed to thrive as a Sixth Form student. The day included a range of other fun activities which culminated with a delicious BBQ served by the school catering team and Rev. Attendance

If your child is unwell or has a medical appointment, please contact our attendance team on 01244 313806 or email attendance@bishopschester.co.uk

As of the 16th September individuals who are double vaccinated and those under the age 18 are not required to self-isolate following close contact with a confirmed case. They will just need to arrange a PCR test unless they have tested positive for Covid-19 in the last 90 days.

Please can all PCR test results be emailed to testresult@bishopschester.co.uk

When to get a PCR Test:

Regardless of age or vaccination status, anyone who develops any of the three main Covid-19 symptoms must arrange to complete a PCR test as soon as possible:

- New continuous cough
- Fever (temperature of 37.8 or higher)
- Loss of or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

A PCR test can be arranged via nhs.uk or by contacting NHS 119 via telephone.

Please contact school to inform us if your child has Covid-19 symptoms and you are awaiting a Covid-19 test.



RSE & Health Education

At Bishops', we believe that promoting the health and well-being of our students and, crucially, equipping them with the knowledge and awareness to make informed, safe and positive choices, forms an essential part of their overall education. We achieve these goals holistically through many subjects and elements school life, specifically but also Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) and Health Education through what we call our Personal Development Curriculum. In Years 7 - 9, this includes timetabled 'Lessons 4 Life' lessons (L4L), and in Years 10 - 13 we use collapsed curriculum days for further age-appropriate and health education. Ultimately, our vision for Bishops' students is that they will flourish and 'live life in all its fullness', making a positive difference in the world through their wise actions and a sense of health responsibility. RSE and education Bishops' plays a really important part in fulfilling this school vision.

In line with the statutory national programme for RSE and health education, our programme covers a wide range of areas in age-appropriate ways, including:

- healthy relationships and positive choices
- physical fitness and mental well-being
- pornography and media distortions of sexuality
- teenage pregnancy and parenthood

Our programme is taught by a committed team of L4L teachers although many of the RSE elements are also delivered by trained specialists from the organisation 'Chester Schools Christian Work'. We find that using this team from CSCW really helps our young people to engage seriously, sensibly and maturely with the often very serious and delicate elements of the programme.

Pastoral Support Team

Mrs L Evans, who works with Year 10 and 11 and is one of the Deputy Designated Safeguarding Leads.

Mrs J Bryant works with Year 9, Miss A Pollen, who has joined the team this academic year and will be supporting Year 8 and Mrs J Evans who works with Year 7, supports transition and deals with admissions. We are very much part of the wider pastoral team of year leaders and form tutors.

We are committed and passionate about our pastoral role which is a very interesting and varied one. We are primarily involved in supporting students and their families and our work covers the following but is not an exhaustive list.

- Support the Pastoral Team with attendance, welfare and behaviour issues relating to assigned cases
- Support students with their emotional wellbeing and mental health
- Support families through the TAF process
- Bespoke support and 1-1 mentoring of students
- Deal with issues such as bullying and friendships
- Be an advocate for the student at meetings with outside agencies
- Liaise with parents, staff and outside agencies such as Education Welfare, CAMHS and Children's Social Care
- Deal with safeguarding issues

The team are all trained in a variety of fields including safeguarding, mental health first aid and emotional literacy support.


